CONSULTANCY SERVICES FOR THE EVALUATION AND REVISION OF THE 2006 OUAGADOUGOU PLAN OF ACTION TO COMBAT TRAFFICKING IN HUMAN BEINGS, ESPECIALLY WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN AFRICA

Background

Human trafficking is a serious violation of human rights and a form of modern day slavery. According to Article 3 (a) of the Trafficking in Persons Protocol: "Trafficking in persons" shall mean the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at minimum, the exploitation of the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labor or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs"¹.

Perpetrators of human trafficking use violence, physical and psychological abuse to control and keep their victims in constant fear². Further, victims of the crime face sexual exploitation and forced labor; while others work in low level jobs like construction, domestic work, agriculture and manufacturing, among others³. Yet, others are killed and have their organs removed.

There are numerous efforts by the international community to address this transnational crime. The development of relevant international legal instruments has provided a basis to establish a collaborative legal framework to prevent the crime. These instruments include: The UN Convention against the Transnational Organised Crime and its Protocols to prevent, suppress and punish trafficking and smuggling in persons, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the UN Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination against Women. Other legal and policy instruments include the 1989 UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and the 1995 Beijing Declaration, which provide the framework for prevention of this crime.

In Africa, legal and policy documents relating to the prevention of this crime include the African Charter on Human and Peoples Rights (1981) and its Protocol relating to

the Rights of Women (2002), The African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child (1990) and the African Common Position on Migration and Development (2006) and the 2006 Ouagadougou Plan of Action on the Prevention of Human Trafficking especially on Women and Children (the Ouagadougou Plan of Action).

The 2006 Ouagadougou Plan of Action on the Prevention of Human Trafficking especially on Women and Children (the Ouagadougou Plan of Action) was adopted by Member States to address the crime in Africa. Among the cardinal premise of the Ouagadougou Action Plan is that measures to prevent and combat trafficking in human beings should be based on respect for human rights including protection of victims, and should not adversely affect the rights of victims of trafficking. Moreover, the best interest of the child, including as recognized in existing international conventions, shall be considered paramount at all times. The Action Plan provides specific recommendations to be implemented by RECs and Member States using the four-pronged approach of Prevention, Protection, Prosecution and Partnership to combat trafficking in persons.

It provides a guideline on the prevention and awareness raising and victim protection and assistance. It further provides guidance on the legislative and policy prescriptions to promote the rule of law while at the same time prescribing how Member States may cooperate and coordinate among themselves to sustainably address the crimes on the Continent. For Member States to live up to their international obligations to combat human trafficking, they need to take action on all four levels. The big question here will be to what extent have Member States taken action on all four levels as envisaged in the Plan of Action?

Since its adoption in 2006, the Plan of Action has never been evaluated to determine its contribution to combating the crime on the Continent. In particular there was no mechanism to monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of the policy instrument on the Continent, and there was no schedule to guide Member States on priority areas to be implemented. The recent Libyan migrants' crisis has also provided a new dimension on the challenges of the prevention of human smuggling and trafficking in Africa. As such, there is urgent need to assess the plan of action and determine its effectiveness in assisting Member States to combat human trafficking, identify the gaps and opportunities, and revise it if need be.

Objective of the Assignment

In view of the above, the AU Commission intends to assess the implementation status of the 2006 Ouagadougou Plan of Action on the Continent. It is envisaged that a Consultant will be commissioned to undertake this activity and develop a report to be shared with Member States for adoption. It is further envisaged that the report will identify existing gaps in the plan of action, and propose how they can be addressed.

On the basis of the evaluation report, that the plan of action will be revised and clear timelines set, together with a monitoring and evaluation mechanism. Once this process is completed, the documents will be subjected to the AU decision making processes, including the Specialised Technical Committee on Migration, Refugees and IDPs.

Scope of the Assignment

Within the context of the above observations, the objective of this assignment will be achieved in three distinct activities, namely:

- (i) Evaluation of the Ouagadougou Plan of Action;
- (ii) Revision of the Ouagadougou Plan of Action;
- (iii) Consideration and Adoption of the Revised Ouagadougou Plan of Action and Tenyear Implementation Plan by the STC on Migration, Refugees and IDPs.

i. Activity 1: Evaluation of the Ouagadougou Plan of Action

The scope of work for this activity includes the following:

- a) A situation analysis of the nature and magnitude of human trafficking on the African continent, and (to the extent possible) provide projections on the phenomenon, highlighting the root causes;
- b) Establish the extent to which Member States and RECs have implemented theOuagadougou Plan of Action in their national and regional frameworks, while highlighting challenges faced and opportunities, for combating human trafficking during the past 10 years;
- c) Within the context of the challenges and opportunities identify aspects of the Ouagadougou Plan of Action that need to be revised.
- d) Present the findings of the Evaluation to relevant Experts and Stakeholders for comments and input.
- e) Present the Draft Report of the Evaluation of the Action Plan to Regional consultations to get regional inputs and specificity.
