

15:30 - 17:30: Climate Finance and Economics

Africa will need substantial resources for climate adaptation and mitigation. African countries are unlikely to be able to generate these resources from domestic sources. In any case, given their very low (in some cases near-zero) responsibility for causing climate change, they should not be compelled to do so. The primary outcome of this session will be to raise awareness, increase knowledge and initiate a high-level dialogue on climate finance issues in Africa, and determine how these issues are embedded into the overall change and development agenda within the continent.
