Glossary of terms

The proposed glossary of terms aims to clarify the concepts and terms. The list is not complete and the information is not definite:

Accountability: Accountability refers to the obligations of partners to act according to clearly defined responsibilities, roles and performance expectations, often with respect to the efficient use of resources.

Child marriage (as understood by ACERWC): Child marriage refers to any formal marriage or informal union in which at least one of the parties is under the age of 18 years. In the African context, the practice is considered a harmful social and cultural practice that violates the rights of the child, undermines their health, development, and dignity, and is prohibited under the African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child. ACERWC emphasises that States Parties should take effective legal and policy measures to prohibit child marriage and set the minimum age of marriage at 18 years for both girls and boys. (African Committee of Experts on the Rights and Welfare of the Child (ACERWC) — Declaration on Ending Child Marriage in Africa, adopted by ACERWC (which interprets and applies Article 21(2) of the African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child).

Discrimination: Any unfair treatment, exclusion, restriction, or preference based on a person's race, sex, gender, religion, nationality, sexual orientation, disability, age, or other personal characteristics that has the purpose or effect of impairing or nullifying the recognition, enjoyment, or exercise of their human rights and fundamental freedoms.

Empowerment: Implies an expansion in women's ability to make strategic life choices in a context where this ability was previously denied to them. It can be a process and an outcome.

Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ): Legal ability of a government or a state to exercise its authority beyond its physical borders. ETJ allows a nation to apply its laws, conduct investigations, or prosecute crimes occurring in foreign countries under specific circumstances. In the context of the African Union refers to the **legal authority exercised by a State or AU institution to apply and enforce its laws or judicial powers beyond its own territorial borders**, particularly in matters that affect its interests, nationals, or obligations under international and regional legal frameworks. It involves the extension of jurisdiction in cases where conduct outside the territory of a Member State or the AU has direct legal relevance—whether through nationality, effects, or other accepted bases under international law. While the AU itself does not offer a single formal definition in its Constitutive Act or core treaties, **the concept is reflected in AU discussions on jurisdictional bases such as in the context of transnational crimes and cooperation with the African Court, which recognises jurisdiction over extraterritorial acts that affect Member States' vital interests.**

Female genital mutilation: FGM comprises all procedures that involve partial or total removal of the external female genitalia, or other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons.

Framework: the [ideas](#), [information](#), and [principles](#) that [form](#) the [structure](#) of an [organization](#) or [plan](#) on which something is built.

Gender: means the roles, duties and responsibilities that are culturally or socially ascribed to a particular gender (AU Convention on ending VAWG)

Gender-based violence: any act of gender-based violence that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual, or mental harm or suffering to women, including threats of such acts, coercion or arbitrary deprivation of liberty, whether occurring in public or in private life.

Gender equality: women and men must enjoy equal opportunities, choices, capabilities, power and knowledge as equal citizens. Equipping girls and boys, women and men with the knowledge, values, attitudes and skills to tackle gender disparities is a precondition to facilitating sustainable development and a future for all.

Gender equity: refers to “fairness of treatment for women and men, according to their respective needs.

Harmful practices: Are persistent practices and behaviours that are grounded on discrimination on the basis of sex, gender, age and multiple discriminations that often involve violence and cause physical and/or psychological harm or suffering.

Sex: refers to the **biological and physiological characteristics** that define humans as **female, male, or intersex**. These characteristics include chromosomes, reproductive organs, and hormonal profiles. The term is distinct from gender, which relates to socially constructed roles and identities, please see above.

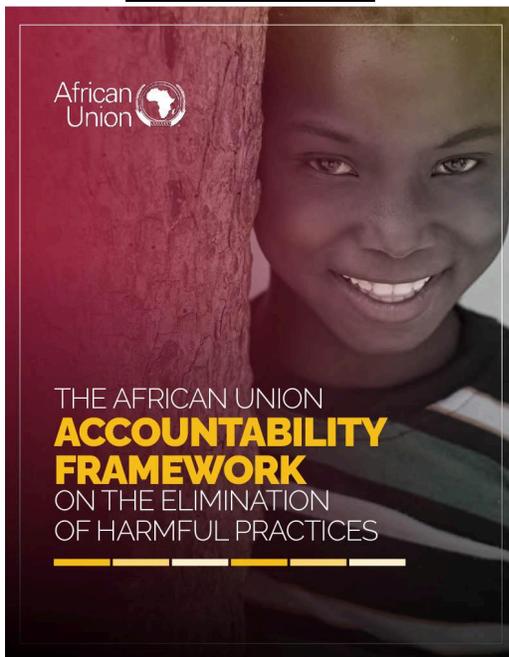
Social norms: Are common standards within a social group regarding socially acceptable or appropriate behaviours in particular social situations and the breach of which has social consequences.

Violence against women and girls: means all acts perpetrated against women and girls that cause or could cause them verbal, emotional, physical, sexual, psychological, or economic harm, including the threat to take such acts, or to undertake the imposition of arbitrary restrictions on, or deprivation of, fundamental freedoms in the private and public spheres, or in cyberspace, in times of peace, armed conflict, transition, post-conflict, disaster, and post-disaster situations (**AU Convention on ending VAWG**).

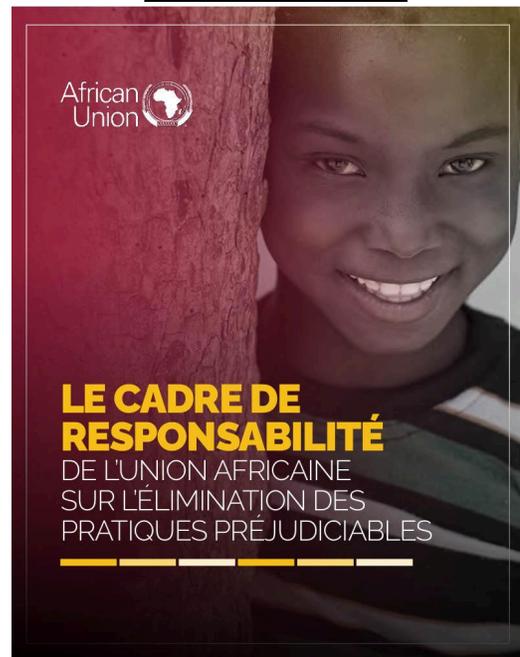
