
Revenue Statistics in Africa is a significant step towards enhancing the comparability, quality and accessibility of public revenue data on the continent.





Comparable data: African policymakers have made their own data comparable with that collected for OECD member countries by aligning them with the international classification developed and refined over 50 years by the OECD. The data are comprehensive, including tax and non-tax revenue for all levels of government and highly detailed, containing more than 50 specific tax and revenue categories, and many more country-specific taxes.

New report: It is the first in an annual series. It gives an overview of the main revenue trends since 1990 framed within the policy context. Comparisons are made with averages for OECD and Latin American and Caribbean countries.
