Therefore, there is an urgent need to take risk reduction measures to help communities become more resilient to climate chocks.
- Strengthening community resilience requires looking at climate hazards and local topographic conditions simultaneously. Building climate resilience is best done by designing and implementing solutions in an integrated manner, using hard infrastructure measures and nature-based solutions as well as governance solutions and community-based practices.
