13:30-14:30hrs	<ul> <li>Session IV: From Implementation to Influence—Africa's Path in Regional and Global Tax Reform</li> <li>Africa is actively shaping the future of regional and international tax cooperation, advocating for greater focus on combatting illicit financial flows (IFFs), a United Nations Framework Convention on International Tax Cooperation to establish a fairer, more transparent, and inclusive global tax system. Analytical data indicates that Africa's annual losses due to illicit financial flows surged from approximately usd 50billion in 2015 to around usd 90 billion by 2020. This amount constitutes 3.7% of the continent's total GDP and is nearly equivalent to the sum of annual foreign direct investment and development aid inflows into Africa. Further, as the continent seeks to strengthen its voice in global tax negotiations, this session will explore its strategic engagement in the UN, OECD, and G20, Fourth International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD4) ensuring that international tax rules align with Africa's development priorities, especially on self-financing. The discussion will also examine African countries' perspectives on the OECD Two-Pillar Solution, while adapting global tax frameworks to local economic contexts and implications on countries that do not adopt such frameworks. Experts will highlight the importance of enhancing Africa's negotiation capacity in critical areas, including taxation of cross-border digital services, resolution of tax disputes, combating Illicit Financial Flows (IFFs), and addressing Base Erosion and Profit Shifting (BEPS). Further, the session will highlight what African countries aredoing to build stronger systems to detect and prevent money laundering and illicit financial flows. 	This session will examine the indirect tax challenges and opportunities related to Value Added Tax (VAT), including in the context of the informal sector. The expert presenter shall highlight the difficulties in applying VAT effectively due to issues such as the limited enforcement capacity of tax administrations and the widespread nature of informal economic activity, which often escapes taxation and leads to revenue losses. He will emphasize global best practices, including the destination principle and simplified compliance frameworks, as well as harmonization/standardization and exchange of e-invoices, which will be discussed as effective solutions.
