- I wish to thank the Governments of Zambia and Zimbabwe for jointly hosting this Conference, I must say, quite successfully. Thank you all for your participation which demonstrates your commitment in discussing what I believe to be one of the most critical issues for the inclusive development of Africa.

- This is in line with AU Agenda 2063 and the Post-2015 Sustainable Development Goals, which, critically, includes skills and capacity development within Africa, especially for young people.
- We have also recognized the need to empower local communities, especially women and youth, through the use of beneficiation and local content policies.

Within this context, we must focus on resource mobilization, preventing illicit financial flows, and capturing revenues at the local level.

- The adoption of the African Mining Vision is indeed a major step forward in our commitment to change the situation, but in order to realize this vision, implementation at the national and regional level is more important.
- Our work this week builds on ongoing efforts across the continent to develop and manage our mineral resources in a responsible and inclusive manner, in order to achieve the structural transformation of Africa and the realization of Agenda 2063.
- At the Commission, We are also engaged in the development of an African Commodities Strategy that supports commodity-led industrialization of Africa.

 Better mineral resource management will also play a key role in supporting the African Union Commission's commitment to Silence Guns by 2020.

## Honourable Ministers, Ladies and Gentlemen,

- We have reached a critical junction. Significant work has gone in to bringing us to this point.
- We have considered issues of institutionalization and sustainability for the AMDC.
- Progress is being made on the statute of the AMDC, but work must continue on the study on Centres of excellence and the financing mechanisms in order for the AMDC to become the institution that will serve the continent the way Member States want it to do;
- As we transition to STCs from 2015 going forward, we will become better able to develop and implement coherent policies across sectors

- We look forward to future opportunities to engage, through the AMV Day, the Mining Indaba Conference, Africa Industrialization Day, and other cross sector platforms.
- We stand ready as the African Union Commission to facilitate and support this process.
