Let us explore innovative strategies for building resilient education systems and other learning options that enhance statistical capabilities for the betterment of our African Statistical System. Together, we can develop actionable solutions that empower our member states to achieve these critical educational ambitions and fulfill our commitments to the African Union at large.

In closing, I want to express my gratitude to the African Union, the United Nations agencies, and all partners who have and continue to support statistical development on the continent. Your commitment is instrumental as we work together to strengthen the statistical landscape of Africa through continuous learning.
